
Cardboard Tube Relief Sculpture



Instruction Packet




You will need ONE paper towel cardboard tube or TWO toilet paper cardboard tubes.

Flatten the tube(s) gently and use a roll of tape to attach it to a piece of lined paper.

Using a ruler and a pencil, extend the lines from the paper onto the flattened tube(s) all the way down. It is very important to draw evenly spaced, neat lines!




This is what your tube(s) should like like when you're done marking them.






Now, VERY CAREFULLY, cut along the lines to create your individual pieces.

Bend or cut your pieces to create a variety of shapes!



What other shapes can you think of?




Arrange, BUT DO NOT GLUE, your cardboard slices to create an interesting design. You may use radial symmetry, but it is not required.

NOTE how I am using the pencil guides to center my design.


Connect the corners of a cardboard square *lightly* with pencil to create centered guidelines for arranging your sculpture.

REMOTE STUDENTS: Create a cardboard panel out of a cereal or cracker box, brown side up! You can also use a Shoebox lid.




When you are happy with your design, glue each piece in place, dipping the bottom edge of each slice in white glue.

REMOTE STUDENTS: Spread Elmer's white glue on a paper plate for best results. If you don't have Elmer's, use your glue stick or hot glue.




TIP: It is helpful to leave your pieces in place and only dip and attach ONE piece at a time!





Cover your sculpture design with a sheet of paper and place a book on top to help everything dry flat!!!



HYBRID STUDENTS: We will spray paint our sculptures and use a single color of paint pen to add embellishments.

REMOTE STUDENTS: You may paint your sculptures IF you have spray paint, (Optional). You will do your embellishments with a thick Sharpie or Marker.

PROJECT GOALS:

- Cardboard tubes are measured, marked and cut accurately.
- You used a minimum of 15 slices to create your sculpture.
- You creatively altered the shapes of your slices to create variety.
- Your sculpture is neatly glued on your base in a pleasing, organized design.
- You used a single color of marker, sharpie or paint pen to create designs that enhance existing shapes and patterns in your sculpture.
- Your took a quality photo and cropped and edited it as needed before submitting it in Blackboard.
